Distraction Hope Chest Checklist

Medical center staff, especially child life and nursing, help patients cope with painful and stressful situations using distraction techniques. For example, blowing bubbles as an IV needle is inserted can make the procedure more tolerable for a young child. Teenagers might use music or a hand-held game to help them relax during procedures. The following checklist includes distraction tools children and teenagers routinely use in the medical center.
