

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COWTOWN CRUISER




Last month the groundhog forecast an early spring, so hopefully that will make for some nice cruising days. A great way to boost your cruiser points total is by using historic markers on the categories they are allowed in.

Cydnie Geyer gives us a little insight:

"Not all historical markers will work for points in the Cowtown Cruiser program, so having an app on your phone can be very helpful. It will give you the location as well as a picture of the marker showing exactly what is written on it. I use one for Texas called Texas Markers and another that covers all the states called Markers. They can be helpful in planning your cruise stops to maximize your points along the way. You just might drive some awesome back roads and find some great small towns with lots of charm and history. So get cruising and have fun."

You can use historic markers in the city, county and state categories to earn an extra point on each entry. The marker must contain the name of the city, county or state that you wish to use it for. You can make your trip down the road not just a cruise, but also an interesting history lesson. Did you know that Purcell is called the Birthplace of Oklahoma or that Mississippi was first explored in 1540 by DeSoto or that Cleburne, Texas and Cleburne County, Arkansas are named for the same confederate general, Patrick Cleburne. So whether your passion is a little history or purely a need for speed, hope you are out enjoying you Corvette.

The Red River Army Depot Cruise is right around the corner on March 18-20. If you are signed up and have any questions, please check with Gwen and Gary Hanna. SWAPPING GEARS

When we first bought our '93 Vette, we had no intentions of racing it, we bought the little red convertible for a daily driver and for some fun weekend trips.

That was before Cowtown hosted an NCCC practice autocross in the 2003 – the first PA since we joined the club............

I've been very fortunate to own a Corvette since age 16 but oh my goodness, I had never pushed one in the corners – WOW! The most we had ever done was a little street, straight-line fun – nothing as fun as autocross. To make that day even more interesting, several of us finally ribbed Glenda (who had never been competitive) enough that she got in and tried it. Long story short, I don't think she got out of the car more than once or twice the rest of the day so I could enjoy another run.

Well, that started us into the fun of competitive events with Lil' Red, my daily driver Corvette at the time. That was fine and we enjoyed numerous events and met lots of new friends around the region; one of the side-benefits of competing.

After a few years of street tires and driving backnforth to the events, we decided we wanted to be able to push it faster. Well, Ken Sutton actually talked us into trying an old set of his "sticky" race tires at an event – we were WOWed again! So we decided to start running the sticky tires on Lil' Red, which also meant trailering to the events.


After doing this for a season or so we decided it was time to stop using Lil' Red as a daily driver and to use it more-or-less as a dedicated track car.

We were excited, Glenda was hooked and so we started making modifications to the car. In NCCC, you do need to pay attention to the rulebook when you start making modifications or you will end up making one little mod that throws you into a classification you won't be as competitive in. After researching the rules, we decided that a rear-end swap was in order; since Lil' Red came with a 2:49 rear-end ratio – great for gas mileage but terrible for get-up-n-go!

The first step in changing the rear end was to locate a gear-ratio that was legal in NCCC group; which at this time was Group 1. The rear-end ratio had to be one that was offered in our group and class (i.e. 1SG or 1G); meaning a 3:07 was as deep as we could go with the automatic. The 3:45 was only available in the Grand Sport / LT4s however it was a Dana 44 setup vs the Dana 36 in our automatic. Finally, we found a 3:07 from a member in the OKC club. These typically sell for \$250 - \$500 depending on their package (i.e. chunk or whole batwing assembly). If your C4 is not a 6-speed manual, you will have the Dana 44; unlike the automatic which typically has a Dana 36 unit. To change to a Dana 44, you will be changing out the driveshaft, ladder and rear assembly, etc.

This 3:07 worked well for a few years until we ended up moving into Group 2 after adding headers, suspension modifications, etc.

My search started and I finally found a new Dana 36 3:73 rear end from a Corvette racing company in Florida on eBay – it was bought and on the way.



Enough of the boring history, let's get onto the technical article of swapping gears in a C4. It's really not that hard of a job; especially since we have now done it twice. You can get the differential out in a couple of hours your first time.

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SWAPPING GEARS (cont'd)

Since I don't have a lift, I started off by jacking up the rear of the C4 and secure it on jack stands; higher the better. I use 2 x 8s under my jack stands to gain a little height.

Next, remove the spare tire and carrier out of the way and drop the exhaust from the cats back; or first breakaway joint. With the spare tire carrier out of the way, you can see your target.





Next, remove the leaf spring. Do this by removing the side bolts first support the end of the spring with a jack and remove the nut and bushing. The bolt is 13/16 and the nut is 22mm. Take note of how many threads are showing as this is your ride height. You can take a floor jack to push up on the hub to release pressure on the bolt/nut.

After that remove the 4 bolts in the differential. These are 15 mm Be sure to take note of the spacers and shims and I would recommend that you tape them exactly as you removed them. The bolts are circled in red.

Re-Assembly Note: Also be very cautious of putting side-strain on these leg bolts when you put the spring back in - if the alignment isn't correct, you will snap these cast pieces. Tighten from side-to-side and frontto-back to keep the pressure and alignment correct as you tighten the bolts.




4. Now that the spring is out of the way remove the end links that attach to the center of the housing. I had to remove one end to remove the half shafts (that comes later) so I used a pickle fork and to swing it out of the way. Again important bolts are circled in red. The bolts are 15mm. Note: you will notice in a picture further down (2nd differential swap) that I left the rear spring attached when I dropped the batwing – your choice.

Before removing the lower arms, I opted to mark the current alignment settings with a Sharpie; just in case something shifted.



6. Next you are going to remove the lower arms. Just remove them from the housing and swing them down. The



Now on to the half shafts and driveshaft. All of the bolts for the u-joints are 8mm. This was shocking the first time I saw these small bolts. There is no easy way to do this and I found that with the shafts in the position in the pic below is the only way to get on them with a ratchet. After removing one, you will need to rotate the rear wheels (half shafts) to get to all 4 of them easily. Once you have them out, you can pull the half shafts loose and let them hang from the rear hub. This is the part that required the



removing of the end link. Note: if you aren't replacing the u-joints, tape them with electrical tape to keep them from coming apart where you could lose your needle bearings. Note: this is where I decided to go ahead and replace the half shaft u-joints as well; and why not, one side is already disconnected.

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SWAPPING GEARS (cont'd)

8. You are ready to unbolt and remove the ladder bar (C-beam as some call it) and the batwing housing. Support the rear of the ladder bar with a jack stand. This is important as this brace holds the transmission up and you will not be able to remove the differential without it being supported. There are 4 bolts to this part, 2 at the ladder and 1 on each side of the batwing. The side ones are 18mm on the bolt and 3/4 on the nut. The big bolts are 13/16 and 22mm nut, best I recall. You can see from the second photo where the long bolts go in the ladder; these are fun to remove and put back in ...but the positive, the 2 at the rear of the ladder are easier than the front 2.





- 9. Now wrestle that old diff out and get ready to swap out with your replacement unit.
- 10. If you bought a complete assembly (i.e. batwing and all) you just start assembling in reverse of the removal. If you bought a diff gear housing assembly (see below), you'll need to assemble it into the batwing after removing the old one.

11. The assembled differential / batwing is now ready to be installed.





Swapping gears is a very easy job and anyone can do it by themselves with basic hand tools. It would go quicker with a friend, if for no other reason you need someone to hand you a beer. The extra hands would definitely pay off when you are bench pressing the housing into place. Since I did it on my own, I found it easiest to use the floor jack with a few pieces of wood to level it – so I could just raise it into position.

One last recommendation ...buy stock in your favorite tires; now you can really smoke them off.

We noticed a significant difference in replacing the 2:59 with the 3:07 gears ...and a much larger difference (of course) changing from the 3:07 to the 3:73 gears which we run today.

So, regardless if you are competing in your C4 or not, the deeper gears are a welcome modification that allow you to enjoy your Vette even more!

As the official Cowtown Vettes Ambassador for the National Corvette Museum, I would like to make the following (not-so) official proclamation: The spring driving season is now officially open! That means it is time to pull the Vette out of the garage and spend some quality time with your car detail-

ing it and doing routine maintenance to prepare for some quality road trips, racing, car shows or whatever suits your fancy.

This winter was almost non-existent here in the DFW area and many of us got some quality "behind the wheel time" in, but there is nothing that compares to some top-down springtime cruises. As such, I would like to tell you about an opportunity for some springtime driving fun in which the NCM will soon be offering.

On April 28-30, the museum will conduct the "Michelin NCM Bash," one of the largest yearly nation cruise events in the country. You might ask why pick this particular weekend to visits the NCM? There are many reasons, and in the remainder of my column, I will discuss a few of them. First, this event will give you an opportunity to get a first look at the new 2017 Corvette. The new model C7 will be rolled out for the first time to the public, so if you have an idea you might want to learn more about the new C7, this will give you a "no-pressure" opportunity to look it over first hand. There will also be seminar speakers discussing the topic "What's New in the 2017 Model Year." Other Technical seminars will feature engineers and designers from the Warren Tech Center, Milford Proving Grounds, and the Bowling Green plant. They will be available to answer every question about the new Stingrays. Also from a tech standpoint, there will be a LT4 engine building demonstration by BGAP Rob Nichols and Brian Lee. Now for my favorite aspect of these events, the road tours. This year there are a few great road tours being offered. The first one I'll discuss is the Trooper Island Tour & Lunch. This is a tour that Cindy and I experienced last year and we thoroughly enjoyed it. Compared to other tours, this one is a fairly short drive. Trooper Island is about an hour or so drive from the National Corvette Museum, but the tour includes a visit to the camp, which last another 2-3 hours. The

trip down is nice and scenic and has some hilly country roads and a few nice curves. The drive is actually escorted by a Kentucky State Trooper who drives a Corvette that was



"donated" by some drug dealers. The Vette is a 2008 Corvette and is officially a KSP vehicle. The camp has a wonderful story and I won't ruin it for anyone going, but suffice to say it was a very nice experience hearing what they are doing for underprivileged youth in Kentucky.

Another road tour being offered this year is the "Park Mammoth/ GTO Heaven Road Tour." We once took a tour which included Mammoth Cave, and it was great, but this tour also includes a trip to GTO Heaven- a private collection of Corvettes, motorcycles and other old cars owned by (aptly named) Phil Wheeler. I almost forgot to mention that this tour will include a buffet lunch in the Mammoth Cave Park Lookout Restaurant.

Other road tours include the Lighthouse Restaurant Lunch Tour and the Grand Victorian Inn Lunch Tour. For those of you who are tired of driving there are other opportunities for recreation, for example the Shopping Trip to Opry Mills and the Grand Ole Opry Tour via chartered coach. If you have never toured the Corvette assembly plant, this is a must do for any Corvette fanatic.

Before I close, I want to mention one more event that being the All Corvette Celebrity Car Show. This is just a free 'show and shine" type of event that is located in the NCM parking lot. The best thing about this event is just having an opportunity to visit with Corvette enthusiast from all over the country, as well as other visitors to the museum. Cindy loves to let the kiddos sit behind the wheel of our car for photos, and the kids really dig it.

Anyway, there are way too many events to mention all of them in this column, but complete information is available on the National Corvette Museum Website. I mainly wanted to give you a taste of what happened at these events. I hope some of you are able to attend. After writing this column and remembering some of the good times we have had at these types of events, I am sort of sad that we cannot attend, but there is always the anniversary event in August.


